Faculty and Department Highlights

ANTHROPOLOGY

Chelsea Mead (American Indigenous Studies) has been awarded a system Multi-Campus Collaboration Grant. Her proposal, "Ojibwe Language Consortium," was fully funded (\$64,208) to support and expand upon Minnesota State Mankato's emerging collaboration with Bemidji State University teaching Ojibwe language courses. Dr. Mead plans to expand learning opportunities for students studying Ojibwe at MNSU and BSU.

ECONOMICS

Saleheen Khan was invited and appointed as a visiting researcher at the University of Ottawa for the summer of 2019. The University of Ottawa is a Tier-1 Ph.D. granting university in Canada. His work while in Canada was focused on conducting a research project.

GOVERNMENT

Pat Nelson presented at the International Conference on Criminal Justice in Paris, France, June 25, 2019. Her paper, "Changes in Student Definition of De-Escalation in Professional Peace Officer Education," won the Best Paper Award of the conference.

Pat Nelson's paper "Changes in Student Definition of De-Escalation in Professional Peace Officer Education," was published in the *International Journal of Law and Political Sciences,* and has also been selected to be included in a 2019 Special Issue about Criminal Justice.

Fred Slocum served as a consultant for a series of children's books on American political officials - one book each on the president, a U.S. senator, a U.S. representative, and a Supreme Court justice. The books, in press as of spring 2019, are being published by Capstone Press, North Mankato, MN.

Fred Slocum completed a two-week Japan Studies Institute at San Diego State University, June 3-16. The intensive course, sponsored by the American Association of State Colleges and Universities, is designed to encourage college and university faculty members to incorporate Japanese studies into their courses.

PSYCHOLOGY

Kevin Filter and colleagues from the University of Minnesota has been awarded a \$1.4 million federal research grant from the Institute of Education Sciences. Project PACT began on July 1st and funds 5 studies over 4 years with the goal of developing a measure of K-12 teacher commitment to implement school-wide evidence-based behavioral intervention programs.

Eric Sprankle and his research team (students *Machensey Shelgren* and *Alex Twohy*) conducted a needs assessment with members of the Sex Workers Outreach Project (Jayne Swift, Andi Snow, and Ramona Falls). This needs assessment examined the workplace conditions and labor rights of Minneapolis-based erotic dancers. Based on the results of the study and many months of activism with city officials, a new city ordinance was unanimously passed on August 23 that will increase the health and safety of employees and decrease financial exploitation of workers in Minneapolis strip clubs. *Eric Sprankle* and Katie Bloomquist, a therapist at the Minnesota Sexual Health Institute, published the research article, "Sex worker affirmative therapy: Conceptualization and case study," in *Sexual and Relationship Therapy, Volume 34, Issue 3, Pages 392-408.*
